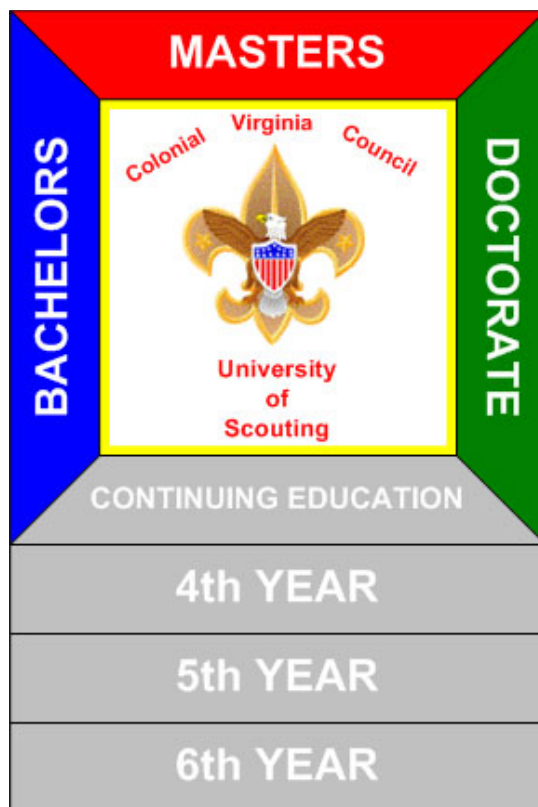

Colonial Virginia Council University of Scouting

General University of Scouting Requirements:

1. Must be currently registered in the Boy Scouts of America.
2. Have completed New Leader Essentials or its equivalent.

Degrees: – The University will offer eight degrees. The degrees and descriptions are as follows:

- ***Bachelors Degree***
 - Must complete six (6) hours of study.
- ***Masters Degree***
 - Must hold a Bachelor Degree from this or any other University of Scouting.
 - Must complete six (6) additional hours of study.
- ***Doctorate Degree***
 - Must hold a Master Degree from this or any other University of Scouting.
 - The process to obtain a Doctoral Degree normally spans two years. During the first year, you should attend all 4 hours of the Doctorate courses (501, 502 & 503) and 2 electives.
 - In the second year, you will:
 - Serve on University of Scouting staff/faculty;
 - Complete an individual Scouting-related project and submit a final report of your project for the approval of the review committee. (Note: Complete requirements to select, obtain approval, and finalize the project will be handed out in course 501.);
 - Give an oral presentation of your project.
- ***Continuing Education***
 - Must hold a Degree from any University of Scouting.
 - Must complete six (6) additional hours of study.

Overview: - The University will consist of six 1-hour instruction periods and a lunch hour. We request you wear your full field uniform. Students should bring a writing instrument and paper. Members of the same unit should avoid everyone taking the same classes and attend different sessions to enhance the experience and to bring as much knowledge as possible back to their unit.

Pre-Registration is a MUST - (SAVE \$20.00) The anticipated large attendance requires advance scheduling. To ensure the best possibility of attending your desired courses, early registration is essential. All registrations received at the Scout Service Center on or before Thursday, December 27, 2008 will be included in the master schedule of courses, and you will receive a personal schedule upon arrival at the University of Scouting.

Late Registrations/Walk-ins – You may drop off your registration at the council office anytime prior to December 27th. The council office will not accept registrations after December 28th. Students wishing to sign up after December 27th must register as a “walk-in” at the University of Scouting, prior to classes beginning. Those registering at the door (walk-ins) will receive course assignments based on availability of space and instructors. In addition, there may not be sufficient handouts for any

walk-in participant. Walk-ins will be assigned on a first-come, first served basis and will be charged the full **\$40.00** registration fee. Due to time constraints, walk-ins may be unable to complete registration in time to attend a course scheduled for the first period. **WALK-INS ARE DISCOURAGED, BUT NOT PROHIBITED.**

Class Changes – If you change classes during the day you may find that the instructor may not have enough handouts for you. It is highly recommended that you ensure you schedule those courses you want to take and then stick to your assigned schedule. In addition, if you decide to change classes after the start of the first session you may not receive credit for the class.

Courses requiring two periods during the University of Scouting will count as two (2) courses.

The President of the University will determine questions about eligibility.

Opening and Closing Ceremony – There will be a short opening ceremony for all participants. Degrees will be presented at the closing ceremony at day's end. These informational and meaningful sessions will surely give a boost to your already uncontainable enthusiasm!

Event Cancellation/Refund Policy – In case of inclement weather, a decision to cancel the University of Scouting program will be made prior to 8:00 p.m. Friday, January 9th. This information will be available on the CVC web site (<http://cvcboyscouts.org>) or by phoning (757) 595-3356 after 8:00 p.m. Friday. If the University program is cancelled, you may choose to obtain a partial refund by submitting a written request to CVC prior to January 25, 2009. The amount of the refund will be determined after administrative costs and encumbered expenses are paid. Refunds will be mailed by the end of February.

Trading Post – A Trading Post will be available to purchase BSA literature, including most "in print" material referenced in the University of Scouting courses.

\$40.00 Registration Fee (\$20.00 for pre-registration by December 27, 2008) – This per person registration fee includes attendance at six University of Scouting courses, a patch, morning refreshments, lunch, certificate of attendance and/or other forms of recognition as appropriate, liability insurance recovery, and administrative costs. Save \$20.00 by pre-registering by December 27, 2008.

Course Descriptions

Cub Scout Courses – Outdoor Program

INTRODUCTION TO WEBELOS CAMPING (175)
What do I need to do to get my Webelos into the great outdoors?
The where, how, what, and why of Webelos camping.

PLANNING A PACK FAMILY CAMP (152)
So you've completed BALOO and even took OWL for good measure, but just exactly HOW do you put it into practice? Where to go, what to do, how much structure needs to be in the plan, etc. With a modestly sized pack, when siblings and parents come to the campout, what are some proven menus that don't fry the cook (and pack budget).

GET READY FOR WEBELOS RESIDENT CAMP (PART 2) (189)
A draft Leader's Guide will be reviewed. Attendees who stay for both sessions satisfy the mandatory orientation requirements for any leader/adult attending WRC for the 2009 season.

Part 2 - includes the dynamics of WRC and what units/leaders will need to know about WRC.

Cub Scout Courses – Pack Management

PACK ADMINISTRATION (140)
Gain pack management skills, records, finance, leadership, and use of resources. Let's see what kinds of information you need to gather and what to do with it - from member information, tour permits, medical information, training, etc. Hand's on working with the forms.

PACK LEADERSHIP CHALLENGE (142)
Since packs are made up of people and people come in all shapes and sizes, how can we effectively lead if we all cannot agree? This course looks at reinforcing some proven leadership skills and guides group discussions to address difficult leadership situations. Participants work in role plays and small groups to identify characteristics and approaches to keep the pack train rolling.

CUB SCOUT ADVANCEMENT (100)
Learn how to motivate boys along their journey from Tiger to Arrow of Light.

LEAVE NO TRACE (Frontcountry) (190)
This course will introduce you to the concepts of Leave No Trace as it applies to Cub Scouts and why BSA feels it is so important.

GET READY FOR WEBELOS RESIDENT CAMP (PART 1) (188)
A draft Leader's Guide will be reviewed. Attendees who stay for both sessions satisfy the mandatory orientation requirements for any leader/adult attending WRC for the 2009 season.

Part 1 - covers information about the WRC Program, its intent, and why Webelos should attend. (prerequisite to part 2)

PACKMASTER SOFTWARE (195)
Every pack has to keep accurate records, but most people hate paperwork – so what can you do? This session will show you computer software that just might be your solution. Include overview of the program, DotNet access, how to set it up and deploy it to your leaders. Pack and den-level management reports & procedures such as how to report and process awards, attendance, fund-raising, etc.
PREREQUISITE: Pack Administration (140)

CUB SCOUTS WITH DISABILITIES (NEW) (153)
Because everyone has different talents, skills and abilities, it's sometimes difficult to successfully lead a group of growing Scouts. When a Scout has a physical or mental disability, it can challenge your leadership skills, but also provide greater rewards. Look at the many ways Scouts overcome disabilities and BSA's alternate requirements for those who are disabled.

Cub Scout Courses – Den Programming

WEBELOS PROGRAM 1st Year (180)

Highlights the first year of the program: activities & advancements leading to the Webelos Badge.

WEBELOS-TO-SCOUT TRANSITION (187)

Since over 90% of Boy Scouts come from Cub Scouting, explore some of the challenges and proven approaches to ensure boys are excited about their initial steps entering Boy Scouts. Include discussions about how to increase the boys' responsibilities in planning and executing den activities, relationships with troops, and ensuring the Webelos know what excitement awaits them on the other side of the bridge.

CUB SCOUT PROGRAM (WOLF/BEAR) (130)

Highlights the ins and outs of the first two years of the Cub Scout program: activities and advancements leading to the Bobcat, Wolf, and Bear badges.

WEBELOS PROGRAM 2nd YEAR (185)

Highlights the second year of the program: activities and advancements leading to the Arrow of Light and the Webelos Scout to Boy Scout transition.

TIGER CUB PROGRAM DEN MEETING HOW-TO'S (170)

Great crafts, activities, projects, and outings to keep your active Tiger Cubs excited about Scouting. Expanded session to cover the full gamut of Tiger activities - Family & Den activities along with Go See It ideas. Integrate Academic & Sports into your Tiger events.

GATHERING GOTCHA'S (112)

Exciting activities to keep a cub's interest while they gather before den and pack meetings. Includes ideas for puzzles, games, challenges, scavenger hunts, and other interactive events that give leaders time to prepare for the meeting while keeping boys out of mischief.

Cub Scout Courses – General Cubbing Fun

CUB SCOUT ACTIVITIES (115)

Where to go. What to do. Come and join in the fun of a Cub Scout Fun Day, Fun with Son, or Mom and Me, and the list goes on.

CUB SCOUT GAMES (120)

Exciting recreational activities demonstrate the value of FUN of Cub Scout games.

RECRUIT 'EM AND KEEP 'EM (157)

How can/should we find new Scouts? What are some ways to reach cub-age boys if school access is restricted? Are there alternative ways to recruit? What about the leaders - how can we find and keep them? What can we do about those who register and then drop?

CRAFTS (2 Hrs) (110)

Come and join us and discover some unusual materials to create and play with. Course includes hands-on demonstrations, resources and ideas of other places to go for crafting help.

SKITS, SKITS, & MORE SKITS (160)

A get-up-and-show-us-what-you-can-do class: techniques, costuming, and props to jazz up that skit.

Cub Scout Courses – Pack Programming

DEN and PACK CEREMONIES (135)

Provide immediate and meaningful recognition to your cubs and leader by including ceremonies into your presentations. Ceremonies include new scout recognition, rank advancement, new leader inductions and several historic/patriotic ceremonies for opening/closings. Participants will receive a resource book of ceremonies to use in their pack and den.

GOOD DEEDS GETTING DONE (125)

We promise to help other people, but what are some of the ways we do it? Interesting and sometimes unique community service opportunities and links to the Good Turn for America service program. How can you include them in your pack plan and still have fun? Did you remember to do a good turn for your Chartered Organization today?

BLUE & GOLD BANQUET HOW TO'S (105)

Create excitement and fun with great themes, decorations, ceremonies, and more.

RECOGNITION (155)

A hands-on of the Who, What, When, Where, and Why's of recognizing and thanking Cub Scouts, Scouters, and other volunteers in your pack.

PLANNING A SUCCESSFUL PACK MEETING (150)

The pack meeting is the highlight of the monthly Cub Scout program. Make sure yours is one that everyone looks forward to!!

LET'S RACE (145)

How to put on a pinewood derby, rain gutter regatta, or a space derby.

Boy Scout Courses – Scoutcraft

HIKING AND BACKPACKING (2 Hrs) (205)

The need for regular hiking trips will be discussed as well as the requirements for Scout planning and evaluation of the event in this advanced session covering the requirements for a successful backpacking trip. Discussions will focus on equipment, clothing, tour permits, physical requirements, planning and evaluating the event, special foods, foot care and shoes, and special places to hike.

KNOTS and LASHINGS (2 Hrs) (220)

Learn Boy Scout basic knots and lashings. A review of all marlinspike (knots, lashings, and hitches) required for advancement.

MODEL CAMPING (NEW) (225)

When the campsite picnic table is holding the stove, wash and rinse water pans, water jug and lantern, where do we get to work or eat? Look at some ideas to enhance your troop's campsite appearance and usefulness. Topics will provide some ideas for camp gadgets, gateways, and general layout of the tents/patrols.

WHAT'S COOKIN'? (NEW) (227)

Explore some of the various methods of camp cooking along with some favorite recipes for Dutch ovens, reflector ovens, foil, tin can, roasting, one-pot meals and other old time favorites for cooking in the outdoors. Course will provide overview of various methods and, conditions permitting may include live demonstrations.

Boy Scout Courses – Troop Program

PLANNING THE TROOP PROGRAM (230)

Take a complete tour of Boy Scouting with a focus on a year-round program. Topics include advancement, the patrol method, training, discipline, parental involvement, troop meeting planning, the PLC, summer camp, and program planning.

TROOP CEREMONIES (NEW) (250)

Provide immediate and meaningful recognition to your scouts by including ceremonies into your presentations. Ceremonies include new scout recognition, rank advancement, new leader inductions and several historic/patriotic ceremonies for opening/closings. Participants will receive a resource book of ceremonies to use in their troop.

SCOUT GAMES (NEW) (235)

What Scout doesn't like to have fun? This session will cover a number of games (indoors and out) to keep your Troop active. Games include individual and team games and activities as well as some ideas for using games as a gathering activity and/or inter-patrol competition.

A SCOUT IS HELPFUL (NEW) (255)

A cheerful attitude of service to others creates a powerful impression. Explore some ideas for service projects at the patrol, troop, and even national level that will enhance your troop program and help someone along the way. Included are some special programs such as Good Turn for America, ArrowCorps, Bayport Beaver Days and support to other public service organizations.

Boy Scout Courses – Continuing Education

CONSERVATION AWARDS FOR BOY SCOUTS (275)

This course will present information on various conservation awards available for Scouts, as well as troops to earn.

SCOUTMASTER'S ROUNDTABLE (270)

A true "roundtable" where we will all learn from each other! For all levels of experience. Scoutmaster's conferences will also be discussed.

ORDER OF THE ARROW IN YOUR TROOP

(280)

Purposes and principles of the OA. How to hold a successful election. How the OA supports the Scout troop and reinforces Scouting ideals. How the OA can refocus your older Scouts and get them recommitted to the unit. Advanced leadership opportunities for Scouts in the OA. How the fellowship of older Scouts from many units increases a Scout's interest in Scouting.

BOY SCOUTS WITH DISABILITIES (NEW) (295)

Experience has shown that Scouting works best when boys with disabilities are mainstreamed within regular troops. While this approach can challenge one's leadership skills it also provides greater rewards for the Leader as well as the Scout. In Boy Scouts with Disabilities, we will look at the many disabilities that a leader may encounter and strategies for handling those disabilities. We will also examine BSA's alternate advancement requirements from Tenderfoot through Eagle.

Boy Scout Courses – Troop Management

TRAINING BOY LEADERS (210)

The Scoutmaster is responsible for teaching his youth leaders the responsibilities of leadership and of their roles in the Troop. This session will help you organize this kind of training, including the “nuts and bolts” of planning and conducting a troop-level JLTC. Participants should bring copies of the Troop Leader Training course.

THE TROOP TRAINER (285)

A discussion of the duties of a Troop Committee Member responsible for encouraging all parents, committee members, Assistant Scoutmasters, and Scoutmaster to complete basic and advanced Scout leader training. This committee member would be responsible for keeping the troop’s adult training records and working with the District Training Committee.

TROOP ADMINISTRATION (NEW) (265)

From the time a boy joins the Troop along his entire trail to Eagle, it’s important to have accurate records. This course discusses troop record keeping using the (manual) Troop Record book and automating the process using TroopMaster software.

MERIT BADGE COUNSELOR TRAINING (240)

In addition to being an expert in their fields, Merit Badge Counselors need to be trained just like any other Scouting leader. This session will teach you how to do this job effectively.

RECRUITING AND RETAINING BOY SCOUTS (290)

Brining in new Scouts and keeping them through the years is a tricky task, but readily doable. Come learn the methods to keep all ages interested and growing in your troop. Discover some untapped places to look for boys including sports leagues and church youth ministry.

SM CONFERENCES & BOARDS OF REVIEW (NEW) (260)

Required for every rank along the trail to Eagle, the SM Conference and Board of Review are the final checks of a Scout’s readiness for his next rank. This course discusses how each should be conducted, who is responsible for them, and shares some ideas to make them useful tools in your Troop’s program

General Scouting Courses

CLIMB ON SAFELY & TREK SAFELY (400)

Trek Safely and Climb on Safely are the Boy Scouts of America’s recommended procedures for organizing and carrying out outdoor treks that involve Boy Scouts, Varsity Scouts, and Venture Scouts. The same seven principles apply to all types of outdoor experiences that involve trekking, including hiking, backpacking, canoeing, horseback riding, caving, rafting, kayaking, sailing, ski touring, mountain climbing, and mountain biking.

GEOCACHING (2 Hrs) (435)

Want to learn about the ultimate sport using a GPS? Geocaching – adventurous and entertaining; a good way to introduce the use of longitude and latitude and even get in a little exercise. Will talk about different types of GPS’s and how to get involved in Geocaching. If you have a GPS and/or compass, please bring them with you.

LEAVE NO TRACE (Backcountry) (410)

This course will introduce you to the concepts of Leave No Trace as it applies to Boy Scouts and Venture Scouts and why BSA feels it is so important.

A SCOUT IS REVERENT (NEW) (415)

Every Scout is encouraged to practice his religion according to his faith. Scouts and Scouters of all ages and faiths have an opportunity can participate in the Religious Awards Program. This course provides an overview of the Religious Award Program and includes information to help conduct a “Scouts’ Own” observance of God’s wonderful works in your unit’s program.

ASK THE PRO (NEW) (450)

Ever wonder what the professionals are doing when you’re not looking? What kinds of things are they taught at National? What are some of the things they’ve seen and recommend? Here’s a chance to learn a little more about the Scouting Professionals and candidly ask them questions in an open, Scouting forum.

FRIENDS OF SCOUTING (460)

Just what is FOS? How does it differ from United Way or other charitable giving? Should the pack contribute as a pack? Is there a difference between family/friends donations and corporate giving? When we give to FOS, what happens to the money? Isn’t popcorn intended as a council fundraiser?

HEALTH & SAFETY (2 Hrs) (405)

This course covers the health and safety policies required by the Boy Scouts of America. This course is required training for at least one adult member of each unit.

RUNNING A SCOUTING EVENT (440)

So you have volunteered or have been selected to run a Scouting event. What all needs to be done? This course will help you in planning and executing a successful event.

‘SHOW ME THE MONEY!’ UNIT BUDGET PLANNING & FUND RAISING (NEW) (420)

What is the ideal approach to popcorn sales and other events? How do we know how much money we need in the unit? What are some proven approaches to fundraising? Suggestions for what to do with the funds such as unit program, summer camp, uniforms, Boys Life, leader resources, etc. What do we do about dues? (previously Cub Scout Pack Management course #107)

Commissioner's Basic Training

Whether you're a Unit Commissioner, Roundtable Commissioner or just a "helper" Commissioner, or a Scouter who wants to know what a Commissioner does, then Commissioner's Basic Training is for you. In this full-day course, you'll learn a tremendous number of things to help you enjoy your important scouting role even more.

NOTE: This course requires all six instruction periods.

Doctorate Courses

501. STARTING AND DEVELOPING A DOCTORAL PROJECT:

You will select, define, and focus on an idea for your Doctoral project. You will develop a plan of action; identify people and materials needed. Discuss documentation and how to complete the project. You will also learn about developing an outline, organizing thoughts and the order of ideas, and developing a suitable format. Candidates have an opportunity to discuss each portion of writing the thesis (i.e., abstracts, supporting material, appendices, & bibliography).

502. DOCTORAL PRACTICUM: (2 Hrs)

Participants will write the timeline (in outline form), abstract their Doctoral project, get the project approved by the Doctoral Committee and be assigned an advisor.

503. HOW TO COMPLETE A DOCTORAL PROJECT:

A personalized session on what to do when you have started a doctoral project; but, cannot seem to finish it. Participants will receive help in picking up the pieces and completing a successful project.

504. THESIS DISSERTATION:

Doctoral candidates discuss their research projects, summarize problems encountered and results obtained, and advise other students of further potential research in their chosen projects. (Schedule for presentation will be coordinated with the Associate Dean, normally late afternoon or early evening)

505. Thesis Resuscitation:

Doctorial candidates that have stalled or are having problems moving forward with their Thesis will receive guidance on resurrecting their projects so that they will be able to complete them during the coming year.
